
Dr. Tennyson S.D. Joseph

Dr. Tennyson S. D. Joseph presented the Sixth Annual Dame Eugenia Charles Distinguished Lecture on the topic: "Neo-liberalism, Primitive Accumulation and Generational Decline: The Crisis of Political Leadership in the Caribbean."



Dr. Joseph, a St. Lucian by birth, is a Lecturer in Political Science at The University of the West Indies at Cave Hill, Barbados since 2003. He has the Ph.D. in Social and Political Sciences from Wolfson College, University of Cambridge, the M.Phil in Political Science from The University of the West Indies and the BA in History and Political Science, also from The University of the West Indies.

Dr. Joseph is a Political Scientist and can be considered one of the University of the West Indies' quickly rising academics. He has written several articles in refereed journals, contributed to book chapters as well as authored and co-authored books on the subjects of colonialism, decolonization, elections, and other relevant topics in political science.

Dr. Joseph, an educator at heart (having taught also at a secondary school in St. Lucia) is a multifaceted or "hands-on" Caribbean man. Since 1994, he has been a Newspaper, Radio and Television Commentator on Caribbean Political Issues on St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Dominica, Barbados, Jamaica and other Caribbean Media. Since 2010, he has been columnist in The Daily Nation (Tuesday), under the caption, "All Ah We Is One".
