### Distribution of Authors

There have been 93 articles with 146 contributing authors, as well as fourteen (14) book reviews in ten (10) publications. Ninety one (91 -61.6%) of the writers are from the Caribbean, seventeen (17-11.9%) from the diaspora and thirty-eight (38- approx. 26%) from international scholars. (Note -the percentage of Caribbean contributors has increased from 44% after the first six (6) issues) when the Index was first produced.
