The Life and Achievements of

Dr. the Hon. Phyllis Alcoherson Russell, O.J.

Phyllis McPherson was born on November 18, 1923 in the parish of Kingston. As the last of 3 siblings, Phyllis was a very self-reliant person who developed an early passion for academia. She attended the prestigious Wolmers High School for girls and later became a teacher



Mathematics and Latin at her alma mater. Her passion for academics and commitment to national development drove her to pursue further qualifi-

cations from several international universities. In 1945 she matriculated into the University of London where she read for her B.A. in Mathematics and acquired a teacher's diploma.

After six years of academic pursuit she returned to her homeland and reassumed her post as educator at Wolmers High School. However, despite her heightened awareness in academics she decided to further hone her skills at the Columbia University. Here she gained both her Masters and Doctoral degrees between 1954 and 1961. Her accreditation at this threshold had now equipped her with the sensibility to facilitate change by empowering students and workers within the Jamaican society.


In 1964 she again returned to Jamaica with the skills and professionalism necessary to facilitate progress among the Jamaican people. She was appointed Senior Research Fellow, in the Institute of Education at the University of the West Indies. She spent eleven years in the position focusing mainly on the research and training of teachers in mathematics. In 1975 she was appointed Chair for the Jamaica Minimum Wage Commission, a position she held for 3 years.

She was later appointed Staff Tutor for the Human Resources Development Unit at the University of the West Indies, occupying the post for 2 years before

moving to the Ministry of Education. As a consultant to the Ministry of Education she spearheaded the introduction of various mathematics programmes throughout the island. Cognisant of the needs of rural educators, she developed a cassette programme to proliferate their efficiency and productiveness. She also inaugurated a Masters of Science summer program in Mathematics Education. In 1978 she was appointed Minister of Education, where she made a fundamental contribution to mathematics education in Jamaica.

Realizing her real passion she returned to the University of the West Indies in 1981, where she spent the rest of her career pioneering training in Applied Behavioural Science, Health Development Planning, Human Resource Development and Human Relations and Planning. Dr Macpherson-Russell's contribution to the aforementioned fields has played a crucial role in the development of policies and programmes nationally and regionally.

Her reputation as an educator has extended national boundaries and has been solicited by various regional and international organizations. She has provided consultancy services for the Pan American Health Organization (P.A.H.O), CARICOM Secretariat, Organization of



American States United Nations Economic, Social Cultural Organization U.N.E.S.CO. In local arena Dr. McPherson-Russell has made outstanding contribu-

tions to the development of workers education, Ministerial policy and the Public Service.

Her extensive involvement in academics and public service through the application of Behavioural Sciences has provided her with little opportunity to venture into the publishing arena. However, the paucity of her publications is by no means a reflection of her academic achievement or most importantly, her laudable accomplishments in social policy and the public sector. She has produced over 10 substantive publications focusing mainly on education and health care in Jamaica or the wider Caribbean. She was also involved in various activities for governmental and non-governmental organizations focusing on human relations, health development and team -building.

Throughout her life she was the beneficiary of various prestigious awards granted by various institutions within Jamaica and the United States. In 1945 she was the recipient of the ISSA Scholarship in



Jamaica and later the Grace Dodge Fellowship at the Columbia University. She was also awarded by the National Science Foundation in the United States and was a recipient of USAID Training Grant. In 1991 she received the National Honour of the Order of Distinction (Commander Class) for her contribution to education in Jamaica, followed by the Order of Jamaica in 2002.

At the Pelican Awards in 1993 Vice Chancellor Emeritus Rex Nettleford describes Dr. Phyllis McPherson Russell in his citation



as belonging to a generation of West Indian thoroughbreds of the ilk of Elsa Goveia, Winnifred Hewitt, Sybil Francis, Louise Bennett, Lucille Mathurin-Mair and Eugenia Charles. He further comments that she epitomizes the dedi-

cation and passionate public servant of academia, as well as a sustained application given to goodness, humility service and a genuine concern for others.

The legacy of Dr. Macpherson-Russell will resonate in the hearts and minds of those who have worked closely with her



throughout her academic and professional sojourn. Her accomplishments throughout her lifetime have left an indelible mark on the development of social policy within the region. Head at the HLSTUEI Ms.
