UNIT TITLE: EXPLORING KITTITIAN HISTORY

UNIT CODE:

LEVEL: Pre-University

SEMESTER: Two

NO. OF CREDITS: None

PRE-REQUISITES: Working knowledge of Caribbean history and the ability to express

oneself orally and in writing and to work collaboratively.

UNIT DESCRIPTION/RATIONALE

There has been an increased interest in local history for the following reasons:

- Greater demand for local material in the schools to satisfy the CSEC and CAPE requirements and the expressed need for teachers to become more familiar with local/Kittitian history
- In its continuing effort to promote St. Kitts & Nevis as a heritage destination the tourism industry is also creating a demand.

The course is designed for persons who are already familiar with Caribbean history and who would like to explore Kittitian history in greater detail. Participants will be guided through significant events in the history of St. Kitts and will explore themes that are relevant to the Kittitian story. These themes will be explored within the regional and global context. Participants will be expected to read original records and extract information from them.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the end of this course students will be able to

- Critically study original sources
- Understand the present through a critical examination of the past
- Develop an understanding of one's own identity through the study of the nation's historical experience.
